

Importance of High-Quality Early Education



90% of brain development takes place from birth to age five


Early education is associated with improved academic achievement, cognitive development, self-regulation skills, and social-emotional development

All children benefit from high-quality preschool, but especially children from low-income families and dual language learners


Children who enter kindergarten ready to succeed are more likely to read on grade level by third grade, graduate from high school, go to college, and be productive members of the workforce




- Licensed and regulates child care programs including child care learning centers and family child care learning homes
- Works to ensure that child care settings are safe, healthy, nurturing, and provide quality early learning experiences
- Provides technical assistance and other supports to programs to help them meet basic health and safety standards



Understanding Development: Early Learning Standards










- Georgia's system that determines, improves, and communicates the quality of programs providing child care
- Launched in 2012, the program has assigned over 6,000 ratings
 - Ratings include a live 3-hour observation by a trained, independent assessor.
- Of Georgia's 4,520 eligible providers, 2,900 are Quality Rated



PROVIDERS





- Assists no- to low-income families with the cost of child care while they work or attend school
- Helps families find high-quality early learning environments
- Utilizes a 2Gen approach
- Serves approximately 50,000 children per week, temporarily 60,000 due to COVID-19 relief funding
- Provides tiered reimbursement rates for Quality Rated providers
- \$280 million total annual federal and state funding; temporarily \$445 million due to COVID-19 relief funding







- Funded through the Georgia Lottery for Education
- Since 1992, the program has served over 2M million in a public-private partnerships
 - 50% of classes in child care centers
 - 50% of classes in schools
- Prepares children for kindergarten across all domains of learning
- Additional Summer Transition Program (STP)
 serves ~5,000 students in a five-week program



Georgia's Pre-K Program Research

- Research consistently shows that Georgia's Pre-K provides a strong foundation that supports children's growth and development across all learning domains and prepares them for kindergarten
- A key strength of Georgia's Pre-K Program is building foundational language and literacy skills for reading
- Children who went to Georgia's Pre-K did significantly better on third-grade End-Of-Grade (EOG) tests than those who did not attend any pre-k







- Beginning in 2017, LITTLE grants support language and literacy instruction in 2- and 3-star infant and toddler classrooms
- High-quality professional development, weekly coaching sessions, and monthly literacy forums for program leaders and infant and toddler teachers
- Also includes literacy resources for classrooms, stipends for participants, funding for a peer coach, and support for credential attainment
- LITTLE has served 159 programs and over 350 classrooms





- Supporting young children's social emotional development and mental health is critical to a strong language and literacy foundation
- Inclusion and Behavior Support Specialists provide training, on-site coaching and technical assistance, and consultation for child care programs, families and teachers.
- SEEDS grants fund child care programs to have an onsite coach, provide intensive training and coaching, and funding for classroom materials to support social emotional development.
- Infant Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation grants provide mental health and self care trainings as well as mental health service coordination for children, families, and staff at child care programs.



Georgia Foundation for Early Care + Learning

- Independent 501(c)3 that supports the efforts of the Georgia Department of Early Care and Learning.
- Formed in 2017 after the Georgia General Assembly passed enabling legislation.
- Created to expand access to programming, to support childcare providers in Georgia, to provide opportunities to innovate upon existing services, to celebrate the accomplishments of the Early Childhood Education workforce, and more.
- All operational expenses paid for by Child Care Development Block Grant funds.
- All funds raised by the Foundation to be used for programming, not overhead.
